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Open or Closed Mindedness – Unconditional Positive Regard

In pastoral counselling, one must be present for a counselee with what is called “unconditional positive regard” for what is presented by that person or family as they sit in one’s office. This is a good thing. Often, it can be mistaken for being open to whatever that person or family system is doing and thinking. Another aspect of counseling is being a “mandated reporter.” While the person is regarded with an unconditionally positive pastoral approach, not everything they think or do is therefore “ok.” This same principle applies to overall pastoral work and the overall mindset of the members of the church. The work of the pastor and the church is to keep heaven open, and we are also mandated to directly address what is harmful to a heavenly life.

What opens, keeps open, and directs our minds and spirits to heaven? Of course it is our life, our behaviours. But these take form according to our beliefs and thoughts. Perhaps one of the most important uses of the Church in a person’s life is to provide a structure of teachings and beliefs, especially applicable to the state of the members of the Church. Our teachings are to give boundaries to the limitations of our thoughts, like a fence around a pasture, or the walls around a fortified city. There are gates or doors in and out of the pasture or city that represent our thoughts in and from the world outside the church, and those which are in and from heaven and the Church. A gateway or door serves as a “filter” to let in what is good and keep what is bad or false out.

Jesus says “I am the Door.” He is the also the gatekeeper. In the teachings of the Second Coming, the very walls and gates of the New Jerusalem are the teachings of the Divine Human that makes heaven and give form and structure to our thinking. Our beliefs about heaven, marriage, life after death, and every other idea we develop in our minds is to be founded upon the teachings from the Lord’s Word. This is what comes in from the Lord.

Alternatively, what enters into our thinking about ourselves and the Church from the world is very important. We are educated and influenced within and by the world and worldly thinking. One of the most important functions of the Church is to give us a filter, that is, to teach us what thoughts and ideas actually belong within the walls of the New Jerusalem. What will we let live in our minds?

These filters and boundaries to our thinking allow heaven to flow into us and keep us open to heavenly influx. On the other hand, thinking based on mere science and the commonly accepted social or political thought patterns of the world can very effectively close heaven to us without our knowing it. In fact, we may believe we are more intelligent and advanced spiritually when we mix the general thinking patterns and doctrinal ideas of the Church with prevailing social, medical, and healing practices or new age philosophies. “Best practices” in one arena, such as politics or business, may be directly opposed to New Church teachings. Recently I found myself in discussion about the “vibrations” of the soul, and the

attunement of one's spirit with the frequency of the earth and its energies. It was all very innocent, but when I offered the New Church idea that our soul or spirit is a discrete degree beyond the natural vibrations on the earth, I was met with skepticism and something close to ridicule. Read the following from Arcana Coelestia 10492:

"Most of the intelligent think of the soul from some hypothesis that prevails in the learned world, from which they conceive no other idea of the soul than as of breath or of wind in which perchance there is a living principle...with those who think this way the internal is closed. Whether you say that the internal is opened or closed, or whether you say that heaven is so, is the same."

What "prevails in the learned world," or in some circles of modern spiritual thinking, concerning the soul could also be applied to our thinking about marriage, eternal life, recreation, the origin of humanity, gender, work, divorce, money, human rights, the sacred scriptures ... the list goes on and on. Really, "the learned world" has an opinion about everything, which is why at the beginning of the Academy movement, which led to the formation of our Church, the phrase "the Writings find us everywhere" was adopted as a motto along with the foundational principle that "the Writings are the Word."

While many prevailing ideas in the world are not evil, and in fact advances in human and civil rights have made life better over the years in many parts of the world, still every new or prevailing opinion must be open to scrutiny according to the teachings of the Word. Or else, unbeknownst to us, we may close heaven to ourselves while believing just the opposite, that we are very open and intelligent, even spiritually advanced thinkers.

The antidote to this is, of course, to take all questions to the Lord, in prayer, and in reading His Word. To have a truly open, spiritual mind is not to be tolerant of all ideas, religions, lifestyles, and political or social philosophies. That kind of tolerance is, in fact exactly "what prevails in the learned world." But while such tolerance gives the appearance of open-mindedness, it can in fact do just the opposite spiritually; that is, it can close our minds to heaven.

Being a member in the New Church is a spiritually and mentally challenging lifestyle and mindset. The Lord, in His Word, calls on us to set aside our worldly thinking and worldly prejudice, and instead begin first from an "unconditional positive regard" to the living body which comprises His teachings. This takes mental training, as we often assume many beliefs simply by being exposed to the prevailing opinions of the world, and our own proprial nature draws us toward ideas that favour what we want for ourselves. We may want others to accept us, to like us, to admire us, to think we are smart, or find us attractive and witty and wise. The Hells use those feelings against us, leveraging them into us accepting ideas which seem advanced and open-minded, while closing off heaven. Thinking that our soul or spirit is vibrating at some frequency in time and space does nothing to advance our regeneration! Nor does thinking that if we put it out to "the universe" we will find a new job or our lost keys or do anything but advance a naturalistic mindset, which makes one with atheism. (see AE 1220:2,3 and TCR 12)

Unconditional positive regard for the teachings of the Lord is the first principle of the spiritually open mind. "This principle is to affirm the things which are of doctrine from the Word, or to think and believe within ourselves that they are true because the Lord has said them: this is the principle that leads to all intelligence and wisdom, and is to be called the affirmative principle." (AC 2568) On the other hand, the more people think by first consulting things of worldly opinion and philosophy, of science, and of what is considered politically and socially correct, "the more they cast and precipitate themselves into darkness, until at last they deny all genuinely spiritual things." (AC 10492)

Yes, let's keep an open mind, but a genuinely spiritual open mind. Let's take our questions to the Lord first and beg him to give us a genuine understanding from Him and not from our own prejudice, "advanced" insights or perceptions or prevailing worldly opinion. We must constantly be aware that what may pass for being open minded, tolerant and accepting may in fact be closing heaven and the church to us.

From the Pastor

These past few weeks have been very busy. At the time of this writing we still anticipate Rt. Rev. Brian Keith's visit and Sons' Ladies' Night.

It has been a very busy time through April and into May. We hosted the GCIC Board and Annual meeting. At that time I took the opportunity to share some of the work we have been involved in with both Maple Leaf Camp as well as the OFIS (Ontario Federation of Independent Schools) Spring Training day.

Maple Leaf sadly has had to be scheduled with an overlap with the Living Waters Family Camp. While the teens with their families are a very important part of any family camp, we hope that Maple, serving only teens, and with a specific focus on their age and state, will still be able, with its unique flavour, to stand out and attract campers who might not otherwise have such an opportunity to just be with their peers in a camp setting. We are certainly looking ahead now in our planning to be sure to avoid this scheduling overlap next year.

The OFIS meetings were eye opening for me, as these were my first set of such meetings. As I said at the GCIC AGM, as a small religious school, we are swimming upstream against a strong political, social, and economic current as we try to maintain the existence and integrity of Olivet New Church School.

Unfortunately, James Bellinger, who is quite expert in school-related matters, was unable to attend the training day, but we hope he can attend a follow-up meeting in the next few weeks. The bottom line is that the provincial regulations, which continue to increase in their number and complexity, mean that our school administration has to do more and more in order to keep in compliance. As time goes on, we will have more to report on this front.

Special prayers go to Liz Longstaff as she continues to gain strength after her stroke last month. We continue to hear positive news about her, and we join with the whole of the Carmel New Church and School community in wishing her a speedy and full recovery.

From the Principal

Let's get out of here!

What is a way that we can 1) encourage creative problem solving, 2) reduce restlessness in children, and 3) help alleviate stress? Hint: it is easy and right at our back door! Answer: Spending time hiking and playing outdoors in a natural setting!

A study conducted by psychologists Ruth Ann Atchley and David L. Strayer found that creative problem solving can be greatly improved by reconnecting with nature while disconnecting from technology. While the participants in this study went backpacking (sans cellphone) through nature for about four days, it

stands to reason that any amount of time spent in a natural setting will benefit our children. This is just one of the many reasons we encourage the children to play among the trees and bushes that are on and beside the property.

The teachers at Olivet understand the benefits of letting children play in a natural environment and will often give up other valuable school time to take the children on a hike to (and along) Mimico Creek. This time is compensated for with increased focus from the children when they return to school. A study conducted by Frances E Kup, PhD, and Andrea Faber Taylor, PhD, found that exposing children with attention difficulties to “green outdoor activities” reduced their symptoms significantly. The results of this study suggest that exposure to nature can benefit anyone who has a difficult time paying attention or needs to move more than other children.

In these busy times, we are seeing more and more stressed children who are exhibiting various signs of distress or anxiety. A recent study published in *Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences* found that “spending time in nature decreases ... obsessive, negative thoughts by a significant margin.” We have found that when a child returns to the classroom from playing in nature, s/he is calmer and ready to learn.

When students at Olivet are enjoying extra recess time, or hiking out to the creek for phys. ed., science, or just plain fun, we, at Olivet, know that the benefits are far-reaching. Let’s get outside!
