### Merry Christmas—Made Brighter by the Dark

In a recent Arcana Coelestia class, we entered into a discussion of the reasons why the Lord was born on this earth. The section of the Arcana that we were studying at the time is a most difficult section dealing with the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah, the escape of Lot and his two daughters, and finally the birth of their two children, Moab and Ammon.

The statement is made that greater details of some parts of these stories will not be explored as they "do violence to our ideas and give offence to chaste ears." (AC 2466) Some of the things mentioned in the Word are deeply disturbing. There are evils that disturb the mind if described, and which generally are considered inappropriate to discuss in "polite company." There are many extremely violent stories related to the many wars of the Old Testament.

What does this have to do with the Lord's birth? We learn in the Word of the New Church that the Lord came to be born on this earth because we are among the most external, evil people in the universe. Jesus said, "Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick. I did not come to call the righteous, but sinners, to repentance." (Mark 217)

Christmas is a wonderful time to focus on innocence, peace and joy. It is a special time to celebrate the Lord's birth. Nothing should diminish the celebration. In the heavens, the celebrations of the Lord's advent are accompanied with magnificent light shows, beautiful singing, and concerts. (CL 81)

The best celebrations are with those who are most keenly aware of depths of hell from which they have been saved by the Lord's coming. The celestial angels are in touch with the depravity of their own natures and how powerfully the Lord withholds them from their own evils. The angels and inhabitants of our earth were in greatest need of salvation, as we are most depraved. The Lord came here because we relate to the most external functions of the body (AC 8630, 9360), like the skin.

As we turn our minds and hearts to the Lord in thanksgiving and celebration of the Christmas story, we are able to consider deeply what is most blessed about this story. Things of light and beauty are better able to be appreciated when considered in contrast to things that are dark and ugly (TCR 763). No one likes to think about evil and darkness. The Arcana class is very eager to get on to the next, more uplifting section of Volume 3! However, we must relate each thing from the Word to ourselves, as the Lord is not interested in teaching us history, psychology, science, or the nature of other people's evils and falsities. He gives us the Word so we can each apply what is written to our own spiritual needs. The Christmas story is a story of the Lord coming to us personally.

Celebrations of Christmas include acknowledging Herod as well as the shepherds and wise men. Joseph had a very hard time accepting Mary's "being found with child," in contrast to Elizabeth being filled with the Holy Spirit and proclaiming prophecy. The Lord came to heal the sick—that's us! And our

celebrations are all the more genuine when we praise Him for coming into our personal spiritual lives with "healing in His wings." (Mal. 4:2)

So, it is good to take the time to reflect on what needs healing, what needs redemption, and forgiveness in our own lives. It is good to be in touch with the dark, so that the "season of lights" and the celebration of this Christmas holiday can be all the brighter.

#### From the Pastor

Society meeting on January 17, 2018: A year ago, we had two society meetings to discuss the Olivet School. The results of those meetings led into some intensive work with school marketing and outreach. At that time, we also noted the need to have the same kind of meeting to discuss the society's needs. We will have more information about the meeting in the January *Chatterbox*, but save the date for attending this important meeting.

Pastor's Council: The last two Pastor's Council meetings have included agenda items related to our worship services, pastoral work, and Sunday School programming. Regarding this last subject, we explored ways to open up and extend the meaningful time for the children attending the Sunday School. There are still details to work out, but one idea which impacts the society overall is a change to the after-church refreshment time in order to allow the children a play area to engage them after church. We are looking at a six-week trial period in January and Feburary. More details will follow.

Baden-Powell Day (part of Scout-Guide Week) – Feburary 18, 2018: Olivet will host a Baden-Powell Day celebration during our Sunday service. Again, more details will follow.

Bishop (Episcopal) Selection Process – trying a new process on Feburary 14, 2018: As mentioned at our annual meeting this past October, the priesthood will be electing a new executive bishop this coming June at the Clergy Meetings in Bryn Athyn. This is the normal process by which the priesthood and thus the General Church governs itself and selects new leadership. What is new in this round of episcopal selection is the introduction of a more formalized counseling process by means of which the priests who nominate and elect the Bishop are informed by their congregations. I found the letter which Rev. Eric Carswell, pastor of the Bryn Athyn Church, sent to his membership a most valuable tool for this. Instead of reinventing the wheel, I took this letter to Pastor's Council for discussion and now, with Eric's permission, I would like to share it with the Olivet Society in preparation for our Feburary 14th meeting. After reading and discussing the letter below (which I will have available at the office for people to fill out and bring to the meeting), Pastor's Council wished to add a line related to their appreciation of Bishop Buss' championing the subject of Conjugial Love during his tenure, and put that subject into the ranking list, as well as a line related to recruitment and mentoring new priests.

#### Desirable Qualities in the Next Executive Bishop

This coming June the International Council of the Clergy of the General Church of the New Jerusalem (GCNJ) will nominate a candidate for the position of Executive Bishop to take over that position from the current Executive Bishop Brian Keith when he steps down at the end of June 2019. In nominating a new Executive Bishop, there are many qualities and experiences that might be considered highly important to help someone serve the GCNJ in the coming years. This is somewhat similar to what happens when a congregation defines the qualities that they hope for in their next pastor. Inevitably, no real human being has them all.

A person's life experience tends to affect his perspectives and leadership. My observation is that Bishop Willard Pendleton (serving 1961-76) brought a strong dedication to New Church education and significant experience leading the Academy to his time as Executive Bishop. Bishop Louis King (1976-91) brought his extensive and recent experience serving in congregations outside of Bryn Athyn and gave attention to this part of the church during his tenure and the substantial growth in the number of societies and circles. Bishop Peter Buss (1991-2004) was the first person to be Bishop who was both born outside of the USA and had international pastoral leadership experience. It was telling that his first words to the Assembly upon taking his role was to speak greetings in eight or more different languages. Bishop Tom Kline (2004-13) had the experience of serving first as Assistant Pastor and then Head Pastor to Bryn Athyn for 23 years before becoming Executive Bishop. Unlike the previous bishops, Tom had almost no time as assistant Bishop to learn the ropes. Brian Keith has brought the balance of out-of-Bryn Athyn experience, time as the Dean of the Theological School, a number of years as Principal of the Bryn Athyn Church School, and 8 years serving as Asst. Bishop.

#### Kitchener Youth Weekend – Oct 27-29, 2017

A total of 40 teens (grades 7-12) attended the youth weekend sponsored by the General Church in Canada that was held at the Carmel New Church in Kitchener from October 27-29, 2017. Head organizer for this weekend, Rev. Nathan Cole, and 14 teens attended from the Kitchener society. Rev. Brett Buick and Rev. Judah Synnestvedt and 13 teens from the Kempton society in Pennsylvania along with chaperone Alison Cole (of Bryn Athyn, PA) also attended the weekend, as well as chaperone/driver Robert Uber along with four teens from the Pittsburgh society. Rev. Elmo Acton brought two teens from the Oak Arbor society in Michigan and two teens from Glenview society (near Chicago). Rev. Jared Buss and chaperone Naomi Reid brought four teens from the Olivet society and Rev. Matthew Genzlinger brought one teen from the Boston/Concord society.



Getting to a youth weekend requires a considerable amount of travel time for many of the participants and drivers, but it is worth the drive. These weekends provide spiritual instruction in New Church doctrine and much needed contact and social time for teens so they can know firsthand that there are lots of other young people that exist in this church. This is something they might not otherwise have the chance to learn, especially if they happen to belong to a smaller church group. It is fortunate that the ministers, drivers, and chaperones for these events are willing to do what it takes to make them happen. As a chaperone, I am

fortunate to be able to attend the spiritual discussion session and church services that happen throughout the weekend.

One of the ideas that I learned at this event about prayer (the theme for this weekend) was that when we approach the Lord in prayer, we are to remove the sandals from our feet as Moses was commanded to do before receiving the Ten Commandments on Mount Sinai. Rev. Brad Heinrichs explained that this means that we are to put our natural concerns aside (like thinking about what we will be eating at the next meal or worrying about our finances) and focus instead on what the Lord has to teach us throughout His Word.

Another useful idea I came away with is that when we pray, we should not attempt to limit the Lord's providence with our prayer. The example that was given was that we shouldn't pray for our job not to end, but instead pray for the Lord's will to be done regarding our job or other concerns in our life. We may not realize it at that time, but if our job ends, perhaps the Lord has something better in store for us if we are open to His guidance. If we approach prayer to the Lord with this attitude, He can bless us in the way that He sees fit through His divine providence.

Rev. Nathan Cole led an interesting and interactive spiritual discussion exploring the deeper meanings that exist in all of the different phrases of the Lord's Prayer. We also talked about when, how and for what we should pray. He let us know that the Writings tell us that we should pray in the morning to ask for the Lord's guidance for the day, in the evening to thank the Lord for the blessings that He has provided for us throughout the day, and also at mealtimes. We can also pray any time we want to ask the Lord to help us with our lives and that the Lord's will be done in all things.

The ministers and chaperones each helped with various aspects of the weekend and once again, the weekend was very successful. Although I didn't make it to the Skyzone trampoline park, I heard that everyone who went had fun even if they were a little stiff the next morning.

There were many people from the Kitchener society who helped prepare delicious meals and snacks, which everyone appreciated. Nina Riepert kindly helped me during the weekend craft time when each teen got the opportunity to create a beautiful fall picture using paint and shiny fall-coloured leaves.

These weekends would not be possible without the generosity of so many people helping in many ways to make them a success. Thank you to everyone who participated and to the teens who attended. I look forward to the next teen weekend which will be held in Sarver, Pennsylvania on May 4-6, 2018.
