Being Right

When I was at Bryn Athyn College, a religion professor goaded his students by challenging them to determine whether good or truth is "most important" in the church. He read conflicting passages to us to muddy the waters, refused to gives us straight answers, and made us grind our minds from one side of the dilemma and back again. I remember being so frustrated with him—because I knew that good is more important. This, of course, was the professor's goal. He wanted to challenge our assumptions and force us to come up with real arguments for what we saw—saw almost intuitively, because it's so obvious. Of course good is what really matters! Truth may be "first in time," but good is "first in end" (AC §3325, TCR §336, et al.). When we go to the other world, the angels will not ask us what we believe; they will ask us how we lived (DP §101.3). This is New Church 101 (it was Religion 110, in my case). We pick this up very quickly if we're paying any attention to what this religion teaches. But boy, do we sometimes act like being right is really all that matters. In fact—and quite ironically—it's often when we're not being charitable at all that we're most certain that what we say is right.

There's a story in the Word of King David dancing before the ark of the Lord as it's brought into Jerusalem. We're told that Michal, David's wife, "looked through a window and saw King David leaping and whirling before the Lord; and she despised him in her heart" (2 Samuel 6:16). Later she reveals the reason for her contempt; David was not wearing much clothing, and apparently in the course of his energetic dancing he made himself somewhat indecent. So Michal says, "How glorious was the king of Israel today, uncovering himself today in the eyes of the maids of his servants, as one of the base fellows shamelessly uncovers himself!" (v. 20). David's response is quite cold:

It was before the Lord, who chose me instead of your father and all his house, to appoint me ruler over the people of the Lord, over Israel. Therefore I will play music before the Lord. And I will be even more undignified than this, and will be humble in my own sight. But as for the maidservants of whom you have spoken, by them I will be held in honour. (vv. 21-22)

He tells his wife that he believes that his joy in dancing before the Lord is what matters, not his dignity, and he's not having any of her contempt. The thing is, Michal is right! Wearing insufficient clothing wasn't a necessary part of David's performance. Maybe a great many people had been secretly laughing at the king. She was right...but if only she had said, "Did you know..." or "Maybe next time wear something else," instead of stinging her husband with sarcasm.

It's an obvious point, but one worth visiting and revisiting because so many of us are so bad at remembering it. How often does our conviction in the worthiness or justifiability of the words we utter blind

us to the fact that we're not expressing ourselves in a constructive way? Let's say a certain husband is annoyed with his wife for consistently leaving whatever she's been working on all over the place instead of putting it away. He comes home and finds the table covered with art materials. Is he right that he asked her not to do that? Of course. Is he justified in snapping at her? Of course not—but doesn't snapping feel so right?

Or let's say that you're having a doctrinal discussion with someone, and they start to apply a truth in a way that you know is not compassionate, in a way that you know goes against what the Lord really taught. Isn't it tempting, in that situation, to pounce on that person you're talking to and shut them down? Isn't there a temptation to tell that person, with vicious authority, just how senseless and judgmental they're being? And isn't that ironic!

This doesn't mean that it's never okay to speak sternly, or stridently, or even harshly. The Lord Himself demonstrates this in the Gospels; His words are sometimes surprisingly harsh. When Peter contradicts the Lord, telling Him that He won't die as He has just foretold, the Lord says, "Get behind Me, Satan!" (Matthew 16:23). Ouch.

Now, because it's the Lord who speaks these words, we can trust that He spoke so harshly because He saw something good that needed to be protected, and He saw—correctly—that He needed to "make an impression" in order to be heard and thereby protect that good thing. We may find ourselves in this very situation. But oh, how tempting it is to tell ourselves that we need to strike out and strike down the foe, when in reality the truth we see is so often so much better served by a humble manner and a gentle tone.

I'll finish off these thoughts with a passage from the Writings; the point of this passage is that it is love received from the Lord that opens up the truth to us and lets us really understand it. If all we have is the truth, we don't see nearly so much:

Because love to the Lord and mutual love resides with angels, so also does all truth and thus all wisdom and intelligence, not only in heavenly and spiritual things but also in rational and natural. For by virtue of love, it being from the Lord, they are in touch with the very beginnings or sources of things, that is, with ends in view and causes. Seeing from beginnings, that is, from ends and causes, is seeing from heaven all things that are below, even those on earth. To use a comparison, this is like someone in a watch-tower set on a high mountain. He is able to look around for many miles on the objects that are below, while those who are below, especially those down in a valley or in a forest, can hardly see the same number of paces away. So it is with those governed by the good of doctrine in comparison with those governed by the truth of doctrine separated from good. Although the latter imagine that they can see further than the former, they do not in fact see any good at all, nor any truth except very slightly and superficially, and even that is defiled by falsities. (AC §2572.3)

That last line rings true in a way that is both painful and delightful: "the latter imagine that they can see further than the former," but "they do not see any good at all," and the truth they see is "slight and superficial."

Designed to remember Kathleen McClure Fountain's love of children, respect for education, and sense of service freely given, and to inspire the best in every student, the Kathleen McClure Fountain Memorial Award has long been available to students of the Olivet School who have met certain academic and service criteria. It is with great pleasure that we can announce that the award has been restructured so that it is now also available to non-Olivet School students in the highest grade offered at Olivet School and Grade 8 and Grade 12 students who are members or regular attendees at Olivet Church.

This cash award is to be issued in June of each year and is considered an individual achievement award.

We encourage all students to review the criteria, not only to determine their eligibility, but as a personal goal to work toward.

The criteria for the award are fourfold:

- a. Olivet Society tie To honour Kathleen McClure Fountain's love of children and the church, the recipient is to be a tuition-paying student at the Olivet School and/or a member or friend (i.e., adherent) of the Olivet Church;
- b. Academics To honour Kathleen McClure Fountain's respect for education, the recipient should be on the Honour Roll or Dean's List or demonstrate similarly strong academics, but weight should also be given to non-academic factors. As a result, the recipient is not necessarily the individual with the top grades in his or her class;
- c. Service To honour Kathleen McClure Fountain's sense of service freely given, the recipient would be giving of his or her time to uses at Olivet Church or School;
- d. Personal reference To honour Kathleen McClure Fountain's respect for a well-rounded person, the recipient would be able to provide a personal reference from the principal of their school or similar authority.

Nominations may be submitted to the Olivet office before April 15, 2018. A selection panel will be appointed to review the nominations received on that date and select the successful candidate(s) for each grade category. We wish every student a successful school year.
