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The Power of Falling

Most assuredly, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the ground and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it produces much grain.

—John 12:24

They say that the only certainties in life are death and taxes. Now, whoever came up with that line clearly needed a dose of cheer to take with his breakfast; these things are far from the *only* certainties in life. But (setting taxes aside, for now), it's true that death is inevitable. The death of the body is inevitable—and a great deal of religious teaching and religious conversation is devoted to helping us through the fear and uncertainty that surround this fact.

But there are other sorts of death. We talk about needing to "let old dreams die." Pieces of our identity die sometimes. There's a saying that "No plan survives contact with the enemy."¹ Generally, this is understood to refer to the plans drawn up by officers in times of war, but it can be true of all different kinds of plans. Our plans for what we'll be and where we'll go too often don't seem to survive contact with the harder aspects of "real life." We know we've got to let go and accept the fact that we're not in charge. Sometimes we're okay with things not going our way. Other times, especially when what we lose is something we'd trusted in or counted on, it's not so easy to adapt. Maybe an idea we held dearly, that gave us hope, turns out not to be true; maybe we experience a painful failure in an area of life in which we'd prided ourselves on our successes. When these sorts of things happen, we experience a kind of death.

This may sound melodramatic and it may sound altogether too bitterly true; either way, the Lord has a lot to say about it. In His Word He talks a lot about dying, and it's pretty clear that He's not just talking about the death of the body. He says, "Whoever desires to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for My sake and the gospel's will save it" (Mark 8:35; cf. Matt. 16:25; Luke 9:24, 17:23). In the Gospel of John He says, "He who loves his life will lose it, and he who hates his life in this world will keep it for eternal life" (12:25), and this He says right after saying the words quoted at the top of this article: "[U]nless a grain of wheat falls into the ground and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it produces much grain." These words do apply to the death of the body; it's pretty evident that the Lord is here referring specifically to His own approaching death and resurrection. But it's clear that He's also talking about death in the much wider sense I've described. The life He speaks of, the life we're to save or lose or keep, can't simply be our mortal existence on this earth. It's the *substance* of

that life, which is what we love. What we love sometimes has to fall to the ground and die, if it is to grow.

That's really hard. Even if we believe that death is only a gateway to greater life, death still feels like death. But death is inevitable. Our bodies can't last forever, and—since we're not God—our plans and dreams never were going to shape the course of real life. A certain kind of death is part of the plan. So be it. As long as we cling to what we have, as long as we keep it from falling to the ground, it remains alone. It doesn't come to fruition. Fruitfulness is strangely married to what can feel in us like death. Abundance and life and joy sometimes only rise out of something that feels like letting go and falling down. What dies is us: our expectations, our love of *our* plans, *our* abilities, *our*selves. What springs up in the place where we let go is not us. When we let go we're cut loose from the shore, and the stream of Providence carries us. And wherever that stream goes, life springs up abundantly. The Lord says: "I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in Me, though he may die, he shall live" (John 11:25). He has plans for us—plans to give us "a future, and a hope" (Jer. 29:11). Who but He knows how *alive* we'll feel when everything we have has fallen into His hands, and is growing.

From the Pastor

Olivet Special Society Meeting: We had a good turnout of both young and old for the special society meeting to discuss the present and future of the Olivet society. We began with a discussion of the current state of the Olivet Church and School. In answering the question "Why discuss the school since we did that in the last set of special meetings?" we all agreed that for the past 125 years these two have been one. There has been no school without the church and no church without the school. But turning just to the society, we looked at our current state. First, I asked what members believed the mission statement of the Olivet Society was. None of us could repeat it. We weren't surprised, but we agreed we should reexamine it and formulate a new one that reflects our current mission and with which we could all connect. A strong plea was made to be more inclusive, expanding beyond just Toronto when helping people learn and live the teachings of the New Church.

Among comments made concerning our current state were a number that touched on the fact that we collectively tired, that church involvement is in a sad state, and that attendance has been slowly declining over the decades. We noted frustrations around the use of space for various church uses. I offered that self-examination such as we were doing offers the hells an especially good chance to lead us toward depressing and negative thoughts. I tried to encourage those gathered to keep the focus and perspective positive. Moving from the discussion of the current state, I did a review of the invitations I had received, along with those of other candidates in 2001 and 2004, to consider the Olivet pastorate as former pastors were leaving. Both letters I received were fairly identical and included the issues of declining church attendance, participations, and volunteerism. I brought this historical perspective into play to show that the state we are in is nothing new. We, along with all churches, both General Church as well as mainline Protestant and Catholic denominations, are facing the same challenges.

Moving from this to consider future planning, I asked if I had missed any recent planning notes or overall plans in the society—apparently I had not. We agreed then that the last "five-year plan" was completed in 2005 and that it had exceeded its "best by" date! However, it would be good to reflect on what was targeted then and what we have accomplished from that plan. We then looked

at the eight essentials outlined in that plan related to worship, education, social activity, Sunday school, youth programs, outreach, greeters, etc. A quick review determined that we had achieved and continued to maintain the majority of the plans we had set in place 12-15 years ago. Cheers!

Now, what about the future? It is hard to make any plans for the society in a vacuum or outside the consideration of the planning of the school. I noted that in the past 18 months the school administration/staff have been working especially hard on the marketing for the school. We have decisions to make within the timeline we originally set in place and have now extended at our last set of meetings.

Highlights from our discussion involved our own sense of what we each individually, and as a group, have done and do for our own spiritual growth and nourishment. We can't give away what we ourselves don't have. How can we best look to growing the church within ourselves? This is what we wish to offer to others! One suggestion was that we not try to develop an "outreach" mission now, but focus instead on "inreach" (if there is such a term).

I did not set up the meeting with a plan to create a new 5- or 10-year plan, but to begin the conversation by looking at what we have achieved and where we feel we need to focus. An urgency was mentioned and repeated concerning the work we need to do with the current enrolment of our Sunday school and its development. Several times, the state of volunteers and the uses that need bodies to perform them was mentioned. Again, this is an old challenge, which former and present pastors, councils, boards, and individuals have been struggling to fix.

The bottom line is that we are doing well, all things considered. We are definitely due to move forward with new planning. We need to reassess the mission statement, but we have strong worship and education programs in place, which are essential, though they need updating. If you've gotten this far, you know what comes next—it is the follow up that involves YOU. The Divine of the Lord MAKES heaven, and the people (YOU) constitute it (Heaven and Hell 12). Our Society needs you to look into your heart and find what the Lord has placed there that you can share with others. In 5, 10, 20 or 50 years, we will again look back and reassess what took place in 2018-2023. What part will you have played in the story told then?

March and April Events: The middle of the month is **March Break**; the School will be closed and some staff, including myself, will be out of town. Please call ahead to be sure the offices are "manned" before you come over.

Easter is early this year and we will be holding Palm Sunday service and Good Friday Vespers service, including Holy Supper, in the last week of the month. Please come early Palm Sunday to gather in the hall downstairs and enter the palm processional in celebration of the triumphal entry of the Lord into Jerusalem.

Looking toward April, we begin the month with Easter celebrations. Again, please come early and bring a floral offering and/or a nonperishable food offering for the processional that will gather in the hall downstairs. April 7 we will host the **GCIC Annual Meeting**, and the following weekend, April 14, 15 the Bishop and his wife, **Brian and Gretchen Keith**, will visit the society. The Pastors' Council and Olivet Board will hold a **joint committee meeting** with the Bishop on Saturday April 14 at 10:00 am as part of the pastor's annual development review process. This will be followed later that day with an **open house at the manse from 2:00-5:00 pm** to visit with Brian and Gretchen. On Sunday, April 15, **Bishop Keith will lead us in worship**.

Saturday, April 21, the **Olivet Earth Day Workday** will take place. Come with your gloves, rakes, and work clothes to help clean inside and out as we do our part in spring cleaning. The following weekend, Gwenda and I will be heading to Asheville, NC, to attend a

wedding. And then comes May!

He helped us understand that these commandments are harder, involving our thoughts and intentions, not just our outward actions, requiring us to reflect on our thoughts and intentions and make sure that we are not spending time wishing we could have or take something that legitimately belongs to someone else. This includes property, marriage relationships, or anything else that is good that belongs to another person. This was a perspective that I

had not considered before. After the discussion was finished, everyone continued socializing with each other. We ended the evening with an impromptu singalong while one of the participants accompanied us with guitar. Once again, this was a fun and enlightening evening for everyone who was able to attend.
