#### The Light of the World

Lately I've been thinking a lot about outreach, or about sharing the Lord's truth with those who may not yet have heard it. The simple fact is that the Lord told us—commanded us—to share His truth with everyone. Virtually every Christian knows the Great Commission, the Lord's last words in the Gospel of Matthew:

Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all things that I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age. (28:19-20)

The Lord's commission to His disciples at the end of the Gospel of Mark is even shorter and more

direct:

Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature. (16:15)

The word "gospel" has come to be almost synonymous with "the Christian message," but the word itself simply means "good news." And what is this good news? That Christ rose from His tomb on the third day? That's part of it. But of course, it's so much more than that—the good news is that God is on our side, that hell is powerless against Him, that heaven is real, that salvation is possible...The good news runs on and on. It wells up like a fountain of living waters. The Christian message is alive with hope and with illuminating light, and at no point is the good news "over." The whole of the Lord's Word is His gospel, and His Word is infinitely profound.

What we're commanded to share with "all the world," then, isn't something we can fit on a brochure or a postcard. It's not enough for us to make our "pitch"—to trot out our carefully worded thirty-second speech—and then dust off our hands and go home and have no more to do with the gospel. This may seem quite disheartening, because talking to a relative stranger about one's own religion for even just thirty seconds takes a substantial amount of courage. If that's not enough, then the bar is really high. What *are* we supposed to share with the world, then?

In the Gospel of John, the Lord gives His disciples a command that says a lot about what the Great Commission really means. He says:

A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; as I have loved you, that you also love one another. By this all will know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another. (13:34-35)

This commandment is perhaps as well known as the Great Commission, but I don't know how often they're treated—as I believe they should be—as simply two different phrasings of the very same commandment. The Lord sends His disciples out before all the world, bearing His teachings, bearing His good news, bearing His love, bearing...Him. The gospel has life unto itself because it is *His* truth. It is from Him and it is Him—He is the Word made flesh (John 1:14). We make ourselves know to the world as His disciples when we let ourselves be made images and likenesses of Him, loving as He loves. In a word, then, what we are to share with all the world is...the Lord. He said to us:

You are the light of the world. A city that is set on a hill cannot be hidden. Nor do they light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a lampstand, and it gives light to all who are in the house.

Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven. (Matt. 5:14-16)

We can be thrown by the commandment to let "our" light shine. Surely the light the Lord wants us to share is not the light of our own brilliance or our own accomplishments. However much we might like to share that sort of light with the world, it's pretty obvious that promoting ourselves doesn't serve His purposes. To my mind, the quality of the light that we are to share is captured best in this statement from the Lord's own Word:

Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you. (Isaiah 60:1) The glory of the Lord—the power of the Lord, the light of the Lord, the love of the Lord—wells up like living water in those who give their lives to Him. And He says let it shine! Take away the veils! It is not ourselves who are glorified when we set that light on a lampstand: the glory belongs to our Father in heaven. It's not for our sake that we shine, but for His—for the sake of the great and beautiful work that He has commanded us to do, the work of sharing the warmth of *His* presence with the world. "I am the light of the world," He says (John 8:12, 9:5). And He says, "I am in My Father, and you in Me, and I in you" (John 14:20). The glory of the Lord has risen upon us, and He exhorts us: *share it*.

Letting that light shine is more complicated than finding the right words to put on a postcard, and it takes considerably more courage. The good news isn't something we can put out there and then walk away from. More than anything else, letting the glory of the Lord shine in us has to do with living a life of charity, a life in which He can be present. He commanded us, "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works..." (Matt. 5:16). He also said, "By this all will know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another" (John 13:35). We can share the gospel without words—and in fact, none of our words will ever be able to hold the fullness of the good news.

And, all that being said, the Lord also commanded us to go to all nations, teaching them to observe all things that He has commanded us (Matt. 28:20). Words have a place in the sharing of the good news. More important than exactly what we say is the courage to speak in the first place. Our God will guide us, if we're willing to put ourselves and our voices into His hands (Matt. 10:19). His goal is to make Himself known to every human heart that is willing to receive Him, for the sake of giving us joy in His heavenly home. If we make ourselves willing vessels, He will do good. He will find a way to do good—in us, and through us.

Most assuredly, I say to you, he who receives whomever I send receives Me; and he who receives Me receives Him who sent Me. (John 13:20)

As many as received Him, to them He gave the right to become children of God... (John 1:12)

#### From the Assistant Pastor

On May 15 I had the honor of being formally called by the Olivet society to serve as its assistant pastor (instead of the assistant to the pastor). Many of you have shared warmth and excitement with me as I've entered into this new role and have left me feeling very grateful—grateful for being received as I have been, and grateful for being able to serve this society.

My job as assistant pastor will be somewhat different from my job as assistant to the pastor, though my core duties will remain the same. At the meeting in May at which my calling as assistant pastor was affirmed I proposed that, as part of my new position, I take on the role of outreach coordinator. as outreach coordinator, I will be responsible for offering leadership and facilitating conversation among those who want to be involved in Olivet's outreach efforts; organizing outreach-oriented events, like classes or service projects; and working with tech-savvy people to bring our online presence up to speed. This proposal was well received at the affirmation meeting.

A number of people have already spoken to me about their desire to get involved with one kind of outreach project or another, or have simply said that they have some ideas they'd like to share. I am very happy to have help from anyone who wants to help, and I'm very happy to hear ideas from anyone who wants to share them. Please feel free to write to me or call me, or to arrange a meeting with me, if there's something you're excited to share. Obviously, I will not be able to put everyone's ideas into practice, at least not right away. In addition to outreach work, I will continue to preach and do pastoral work at Olivet and travel for the GCIC. So, I will probably only be working on one or two outreach projects at a time. But please don't let that be a damper on your excitement to share your ideas! They will inform the outreach work that gets done, even if we can't act on them directly.

I also believe strongly that outreach is truly the work of a congregation, rather than the work of a pastor flying solo. It is, after all, our church that we will be inviting people to, not my church. I talked at the meeting in May about the need for each of us to be the church, in order to have a church that's worth inviting people to. That's the deep and spiritual side of congregational outreach—and that's what the cover article in this issue of the Chatterbox is about. A less profound, but still important, level of congregational outreach is simply getting people involved. At some point I'd love to hold some brainstorming meetings to collect input from lots of

people on specific topics—once I've figured out what those specific topics will be. There are a lot of different things that need to be done or could be done, and figuring out where to start is a little dizzying—but in a good way. I'm excited to be doing this work.

### GCIC-sponsored Spring youth weekend in Toronto—May 3-5, 2019

The Olivet New Church welcomed a total of 44 people (32 teens and 12 chaperones and drivers) to Toronto for the spring youth weekend that took place from May 3 to 5. Teens from six New Church congregations were present, including 11 teens from; seven teens from Kitchener with Rev. Nathan Cole; five teens from Glenview; five teens from Oak Arbor with Rev. Elmo Acton; three teens from Olivet with Rev. Michael Cowley, Rev. Jared Buss and chaperone Naomi Reid; and one teen from Pittsburgh.

On Friday evening after everyone enjoyed pizza for dinner, twelfth grade students \*\*\*personal info removed from online version\*\*\* hosted an interesting visual presentation on their service trip to Ghana. They told us that when they arrived in Ghana, they were warmly welcomed by their hosts and given the opportunity to teach the children of three elementary schools (including a New Church School) in the Tema area. The teens brought over two hundred pounds of books with them to donate to these schools. The group that went to Ghana really enjoyed the service project, and we heard many interesting anecdotes from their trip. In a thank you letter to the GCIC (one of their sponsors), they stated that, "while we were there, the Tema children sang the hymn, 'Jesu, Jesu' to welcome us to their school. It was such a heartwarming experience to see the bright smiling faces of those children singing about the Lord. All the wonderful friendships we formed and the memories we made are a great treasure. I can't wait to see how the Lord will continue to build on these foundations in the future." This presentation was one of the interesting highlights of the weekend which demonstrated that there are many good things that can be accomplished when we find useful ways to serve others.

After the service trip presentation, I led some warmup games for the teens. The goal with these games is for the teens to meet and interact with other teens whom they do not know as a way of building bridges between them and also helping them get the chance to learn the names as well as something interesting about each person in the group.

Rev. Cole led the vespers service and spoke about the spiritual theme for the weekend, which was "Uses: Putting religion to work." After vespers and some more visiting/basketball time, the teens and their chaperones went to their respective areas of the church to sleep.

On Saturday morning after breakfast, Rev. Brett Buick led a class and discussion on uses. He shared the idea that usefulness is putting good into action by means of wisdom. The teens got a chance to practice what they had learned in this class when they split into three teams and did gardening work for Richview Residence for Seniors, Eatonville Care Centre, and the Olivet New Church. They also performed all jobs involved in hosting a pancake breakfast on Sunday for the Olivet Church and School community, just before church.

After the gardening service project, lunch was served, and then after lunch, everyone was given the opportunity to take a shower. Thanks to our hosts \*\*\*personal info removed from online version\*\*\*! We then drove to Kelso Conservation Area and went hiking. After a steep walk up the ski hill, Rev. Michael Cowley led a hike along the trails in the woods. The kids found it fun to explore the interesting rock formations and caverns along the trail. When they returned from their two-hour hike, we had BBQ hamburgers, potato salad, and a variety of desserts waiting for everyone to enjoy for dinner. After dinner, Rev. Michael Cowley led a singalong while he accompanied us on his guitar. Eventually, it was time to head back to Olivet for the craft session. During this time, everyone got the chance to create their own version of a heavenly garden using objects like a gazebo, park bench, water fountain, and bridge designed and printed on a 3D printer by John Reid. A church member came over to the church to help with the craft session. It was fun to see how everyone designed vastly different, interesting, and beautiful creations with the supplies they were given. After the craft was done, everyone headed up to the chapel for the vespers service given by Rev. Acton. After the talk, one of the teens played lovely music on her guitar and many teens stayed to enjoy her playing. Following the vespers service, the tables and chairs were set up for the

Sunday morning pancake breakfast, and then the Kempton teens taught the other teens how to line dance to the song "Cotton-Eyed Joe." The teens enjoyed this part of the evening and even tried out more formal dancing led by the Kempton chaperones. Eventually it was time for bed, because everyone knew it would be an early morning to prepare for the pancake breakfast.

On Sunday morning, all the teens were in high gear as they welcomed guests, cooked and served pancakes and sausages, and cleaned up afterward. Soon it was time for church, where Rev. Michael Cowley talked about the birth and childhood of the sons of Abraham and Sarah (Ishmael and Isaac) and the rational states they represent in us.
