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The First Advent Prophecy

I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your seed and her seed. He will tread down your head, and you will bruise His heel.

—Genesis 3:14-15

These words from Genesis are widely recognized as the first prophecy of the Lord's Advent. This might feel a little surprising. The symbolism in these verses is dense, and not necessarily easy to understand, but they don't seem to have much to do with Christmas. The woman referred to in these verses is Eve, the first woman, and the creature addressed here is the serpent who deceived her. What does a rivalry between these two figures have to do with the coming of the Lord? Other Advent prophecies—such as, "Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son" (Isaiah 7:14)—are much easier to identify. But it has long been understood (by Jewish, Christian, and New Church scholars alike) that the "He" referred to in these verses is the Messiah, and that makes this the Scriptures' first foreshadowing of His coming and the first indication of His purpose.

Prophecies of the Lord's Advent play an important part in the Christmas story and in the story of the gospel overall. He came to earth to fulfil those prophecies. Throughout His ministry, He was answering them. And when He was born they loomed over Him—waiting for Him, as it were. Though they're only words echoing out of the distant past (distant even at the time of the Lord's birth), they're essential to the establishment of tension in the Christmas story, and from that tension comes much of the story's wonder and beauty. Such a weight of history and expectation, so many years of waiting, so much scholarship and study, so much hope, all leaned down and rested on a baby lying in a manger.

Some Advent prophecies are easier to appreciate, in this context, than others. For example, in Isaiah we're told the names of the Messiah—and it's not hard to feel a touch of awe when we consider that those names belonged to Jesus Christ even as He lay in Mary's arms. That baby was Wonderful, the Counselor, God, the Mighty One, the Father of Eternity, the Prince of Peace (Isaiah 9:6). The idea that that baby had come to earth to tread down a serpent's head is, perhaps, a little harder to appreciate. But it's a powerful idea nonetheless. Some of that power comes from the fact that this idea shows us the purpose of the Lord's Advent: He came to earth to conquer the serpent. His reasons for being born on earth are expressed in different ways in countless other places throughout the Word; in Matthew, for example, we're told, "He will save His people from their sins" (1:21). But because the prophecy in Genesis is the first of all the statements of His purpose, there's a sense in which it holds sway above them all. The Lord came to earth to conquer the serpent; that baby who lay in a manger was there because He needed to do battle with an ancient enemy. This can be a difficult idea to digest, and it's somewhat at odds with the peaceful and gentle themes that we love to celebrate at Christmastime. But the wonder of the Christmas story is that the baby Lord was so many things at once: He was a helpless child and He

was Almighty God; He was the Mighty One and the Prince of Peace. He was Divine innocence made flesh, and He was impelled by a zealous desire to save the human race from its oldest enemy.

The serpent is widely understood to be a symbol for the devil, or evil incarnate, or something like that. In Genesis, it whispers against God and deceives the first woman and her husband. In the book of Revelation, it reappears as a dragon doing battle with the forces of heaven—this dragon is referred to as, "that serpent of old, called the devil and satan" (12:9). In Isaiah we're introduced to a figure who's come to be known as Lucifer, regarding whom we read,

How you are fallen from heaven, O Lucifer, son of the morning! ... For you have said in your heart, 'I will ascend into heaven, I will exalt my throne above the stars of God...'... Yet you shall be brought down to Sheol, to the lowest depths of the pit. (14:12-15)

Christian thought has tended to associate Lucifer both with the serpent in Eden and with the dragon of Revelation, and those associations are supported by the teachings of the New Church (see Arcana Coelestia §§254 & 257). The point is that it's not hard to identify this serpent as "the big bad guy"—the archvillain of the entire story of the Word, who disappears from time to time but always reappears. The New Church teaches that there is not one supreme leader of hell: "the Devil" and "Satan" are not names for an individual, but for hell as a whole (AC §251, et al.). This is an important teaching, because the idea that there is a lord of hell—the eternal archnemesis of the Lord of heaven—implies that God is not truly the god of all things. If He doesn't rule over hell, He's not omnipotent, and He's not really in control. The truth is that the Lord Jesus Christ rules even over hell—though hell's inhabitants do not willingly obey Him.

So it's best not to get carried away thinking of the serpent as an individual with its own identity and personality. Nevertheless, the Word does sometimes represent hell as a single monster—and that's a powerful image. It gives us something to be afraid of, something to recoil from; it gives us a reason to need a Saviour. Of course, the truth is that hell exists not somewhere beyond the world's edge, but within human hearts. The uncomfortable truth is that, as often as not, it is our own selfish choices and evil actions that are the enemy. The Lord came to tread down the head of the serpent, and He came to save us from our sins; the two are one and the same. The enemy within is one we can't easily take refuge from. We can deny that it exists, but we can't stop feeling its presence. But this only means we need a Saviour that much more desperately. The enemy is at the door; the enemy has power over us; yes, we have a part in it, but it's also a monster, a serpent, a dragon that preys on us. It's a creature that's hunted the human race from the beginning; yes, we made it ourselves, but it is also not us. It need not be us—and because of that, we can be saved from it.

And that's what the Lord was born to do. Strangely and wonderfully, He came to us as something poor and gentle, seemingly weak. When He grew up and began His ministry, there were times when He spoke sternly and times when His Divine power flashed from Him. But He also never stopped being unexpectedly gentle, unexpectedly humble. That's the tension of the Christmas story, and the tension of the gospel: the Lord Jesus Christ is so many things at once, so many things that don't easily converge within our limited conceptions. The baby Lord was a warrior—that was what made Him a Saviour. And yet, He was Innocence itself, and thoughts of Him will never cease to stir hearts with impressions of holy peace.



Pittsburgh Youth Weekend—September 27–29, 2019

Forty-five full-time and three part-time teens attended the Pittsburgh Youth Weekend (sponsored by the General Church in Canada) from September 27 to 29, 2019. The breakdown of numbers from eight New Church societies was as follows: Fourteen teens attended from Kempton with Rev. Brett Buick and Katrin Jungé, eight teens attended from Kitchener with Rev. Nathan Cole, eight teens attended from Washington, DC with Rev. Judah Synnestvedt and Carina Heinrichs, five teens attended from Pittsburgh with

Rev. Calvin and Maggie Odhner and Gabby Uber, four teens attended from Glenview (Chicago), one teen attended from Oak Arbor with Cindy Parker, three teens attended from Sarver, two teens attended from Toronto and Sudbury with Rev. Jared Buss and Naomi Reid, and three additional teens from Pittsburgh and Sarver attended part of the weekend. Our Pittsburgh hosts, Rev. Calvin and Maggie Odhner, worked very hard to make this a well organized, fun, and successful New Church youth event. I don't think that the amount of careful planning it takes to make these youth weekends work well can be overstated, but they rose to the challenge.



The weekend started after all groups arrived on Friday evening about 6:30 pm, with pizza and energetic group games. After this, everyone went outside to enjoy a lovely warm evening with crickets chirping contentedly and sat around the sunken garden in front of the church for a campfire and a vespers service led by Rev. Odhner. One of the ideas he shared with the group was Swedenborg's Rules of Life, which are stated as "Diligently to read and meditate on the Word of God. To be content under the dispensations of God's providence. To observe propriety of behavior and to keep the conscience clear. To obey what is ordered, to attend faithfully to one's office and other duties and in addition, to make one's self useful to society in general." He kindly gave everyone a lovely printed version of these wise words to live by. I was glad to receive a copy of this and will be putting it up above my desk so I can read it when I need to remind myself to trust in the Lord's leading. After the vespers service was over, some teens stayed around the campfire to

visit with each other and sing songs, while others went inside to visit or play games. Later on, it was time for snacks and then everyone went to their sleeping quarters. It had been a long day's drive to get to the teen weekend event, so it seemed that the teens didn't take too long to settle down and go to sleep.

On Saturday morning, everyone woke up bright and early to enjoy a hot breakfast that was prepared by kind volunteers from the Pittsburgh New Church society. By 8:30 am, everyone piled into vehicles to drive to "Camp Guyasuta," which has lots of fun group activities. The staff at this camp divided our large group into four smaller groups of teens and led them through various challenging team-building exercises. After they learned how to work together cooperatively as a group, they were allowed to try the zip line and the elevated ropes course. (All teens were attached with a safety harness before they could participate in either of these fun activities.) A few of the chaperones tried out these activities while others gave their support from the safety of the ground. Everyone ate lunch at the camp before returning to the Pittsburgh New Church. We then walked over to Frick Park and sat on the circular stone wall for a doctrinal class led by Rev. Nathan Cole. The class focused on the importance of Holy Supper and how we make a connection with the Lord by participating with sincerity and being in state of repentance. After the class, the teens had free time to play games, socialize, or take showers, while some of the adults worked to prepare a surprise birthday celebration and BBQ dinner for Rev. Calvin Odhner and all of the participants of the teen weekend. We had almost finished eating when it began to rain and had to move things indoors. After the rain stopped, Rev. Odhner took the teens to Frick Park to play capture the flag. Finally, it was time for an evening vespers service with Rev. Brett Buick, who explained what is involved with the Holy Supper and that the correspondence of wine is spiritual truth from the Lord and bread is spiritual love from the Lord and that by taking these things into our bodies a powerful connection with the Lord is established. After the service, there was some time for socializing and then everyone went to bed.

On Sunday morning, all the teens helped Maggie Odhner prepare a lovely lunch (company chicken, beans, mashed potatoes, salad, and a variety of home-made pies). The teens would be serving this lunch to the members of the Pittsburgh society before sitting down to eat themselves. The group finished cooking in time to pack up their belongings, clean the church .and get ready to attend church at 11:00 am. In his sermon, one of the things Rev. Jared Buss preached about was not needing to fear death if we have trust in the Lord and obey His commandments. After church, everyone enjoyed the lovely meal outside in the sunken garden while they visited with each other. After, the meal it was time to head for home.

If this recollection of events was all that I chose to write about, you would not get any sense of all the good that was accomplished throughout the weekend. The teens were given several opportunities to learn important spiritual information for their lives and also got the chance to strengthen old friendships and form new connections with each other. The ministers and chaperones also got the chance to make meaningful connections and support each other in the work they do, while working together to support this important use for the young people of church. I observed that the teens interacted positively with each other and were helpful to adults whenever they were asked to be. Additionally, I also appreciated the beautiful and powerful singing that happened during the Sunday service and was privileged to hear the lovely descant voices of some members of the Pittsburgh society. The strong and beautiful singing voices reminded me that when we get together to form a larger New Church group, we can feel stronger, and it is wonderful when a group of like-minded people work together to serve the Lord by serving the young people in our congregations. Rev. Odhner smiled warmly at the young people as he told them that they are the future of our church.

After the event was over, I asked one of the young people if he noticed any difference between the teens he got to know at the New Church youth weekend and the teens he is friends with in his public school. He let me know that although he had good friends in both places, he felt that the friendships that he had with the teens that were part of the New Church were much deeper than the friendships he had out of the church. I would be willing to bet that many of us feel this way.
